The Forgotten Affairs of Youth by Alexander McCall Smith

Helping Students Succeed at the Literacy Council of Lancaster-Lebanon

Become a positive force in the life of an adult student. The Literacy Council needs volunteer tutors who are ready, willing and able to give three hours per week tutoring adult students trying to ***transform their lives, sustain their families and strengthen their communities.*** Life changing student outcomes are getting a GED, obtaining employment, improving employment, and/or entering post-secondary education or training.

In addition to the Adult Basic Education (ABE) and English as a second language (ESL) instruction, they now integrate career pathways into the overall curriculum. One new program is called I'll Succeed. The students in the I'll Succeed Program work on improving their reading, math and language skills in the context of employment skills such as basic computer, team problem solving, interviewing strategies, interpersonal communication, resume construction and ultimately, job search and job obtainment.
